



BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Alabama Chess Federation Board of Directors convened February The Alabama Chess Federation Board of Directors convened February 15 in Montgomery in conjunction with the Queen of Hearts tournament. In attendance were: Walter Schaetzle, ACF president; Igor Ostapczuk, ACF secretary; Bill Hendry, ACF treasurer; Bill Bryan, ACF past president; Jerry Wheeler, Muntsville representative; Bill Therrell, Rirmingham representative; Chris Bond, Montgomery representative; Larry Britt, Mobile representative; Tom Burkett, Dothan representative; and Thad Rogers of Macon, Ga. Absent were: Sam Pezzillo, ACF Vicepresident; and a representative for the University of Alabama.

Decisions were:

1) Award the Birminglem Chess Club the right to conduct the 1976 Alabama Championships (see page 23) by virtue of a bid prize fund (continued) of \$800.

- 2) Sanction the North Alabama Invitational, a high school team tournament sponsored annually by the Grissom High School Chess Club in Huntsville, and closed to North Alabama schools. (see page 21)
- 3) Conduct an Alabama High School Individual Championship to be sponsored by the University of Alabama and to be USCF rated. The University will offer ACF membership to participants for 11 to expire Labor Day Weekend. (see page 18)
- 4) Conduct an Alabama High School Team Championship to be sponsored by the University of South Alabama and to be USCF rated. The University will offer ACF membership to participants for \$1 to expire Labor Day weekend. (see page 22)
- 5) Give Thad Rogers of International Chess Imports permission to conduct an Open Tournament in Montgomery requiring ACF membership. (see page 22)
- 6) Conduct an Alabama Team Championship to be sponsored by the University of Alabama and to admit teams from any ACF affiliate.

ACF president, Dr. Walter Schaetzle, has called another Board of Directors meeting to be held in conjunction with the Vulcan Open in Birmingham, May 22 & 23. Any affiliated club may send a delegate.

4th QUEEN OF HEARTS

The Queen of Hearts was another door-buster this year with 111 entrants in two sections. The Montgomery Chess Club abandoned the old Whitley Hotel, downtown, and moved out to the Ramada Inn East. The Whitley had served as playing site for many club and open tournaments the last several years, but the high price of playing rooms forced the move. Everybody seemed to like the Ramada better anyway.

Thad Rogers sold books and 2 door prizes of \$7.50 worth of merchandise were won by Francis Roemer and Carl Rogers (no relation to Thad). Rogers selected My Best Games of Chess, Vol. 2 and Meet the Masters. Rogers selected How Fischer Plays Chess and How to Play the Openings

The clear winner of the Open Section was Marty Appleberry, that old man of chess (at 24) who scored 41-1. Marty took home the trophy and

Incidentally, his score included a win over Steve Hudson who had upset Marty in Birmingham (game in Feb. Antics) knocking him out of a chance to play at Lone Pine in the Louis D. Statham tournament. The Statham tournament was won by Tigran Petrosian, former World Champion.

Hudson took 374 and the 2nd place trophy on tiebreak over Expert Pete Leuthold. Pete, a native of Germany, recently moved to Montgomery from Alaska, and took the 3rd place trophy and \$54.


Sorry no games as of yet. But I promise to send you some of the match games, annotated by our study group.
