

d. The sponsoring chess club, or the tournament director, or the tournament organizer responsible for the ACJ tourney will submit 25¢ per individual entered (whether or not any single individual or group want to be in the ACJ) to

the ACJ coordinator. Alabama Chess Jackpot points cannot be awarded to individuals until the ACJ fee has been paid.

e. Prizes will be awarded based on a percentage of the ACJ fund by the ACJ coordinator. 1st Place - 20% / 2nd Place - 1% / 3rd Place - 10% / 4th thru

10th Places - 5% / 1st Under 1600 (as of the Monday prior to Labor Day) - 10% / the ACF will receive 10%.

4. Responsibilities

- a. Alabama Chess Federation
- (1) Annually, the officers of the ACF will appoint an ACJ coordinator at the Labor Day weekend business meeting.

- (2) The officers of the ACF are responsible to the ACF membership for supervision of the actions of the ACJ coordinator.
- (3) The secretary of the Alabama Chess Federation will send the name and address of the ACJ coordinator to each of the ACF affiliates within 30 days.
- (4) The Alabama clearinghouse will notify the ACJ coordinator of all scheduled ACF/USCF tournaments.
 - b. Alabama Chess Jackpot Coordinator
- (1) The ACJ coordinator along with the ACF officers will open a bank account specifically for the ACJ. This account will require the ACJ coordinator's signature and at least one of the ACF officer's signature to be able to withdraw funds.
- (2) The ACJ coordinator will submit a report at the Labor Day business meeting with accounting and ACJ winners' names.
- (3) ACJ coordinator will ensure that every possible attempt is made to award prizes to the proper recipients.
- (4) If the ACJ coordinator is unable to award any prize, this will be recorded in the minutes of the business meeting during the Queen of Hearts tourney and the unused prize fund will go into the ACF treasury.

b. ACJ Coordinator (continued)

- (5) The ACJ coordinator will be the final authority on points awarded during the year's tournament play.
- c. Sponsoring Chess Clubs; Tournament Organizers; Tournament Directors
- (1) Notify the ACJ coordinator as soon as possible of $\frac{\text{plans}}{\text{max}}$ to have an ACF/USCF tournament.
- (2) Send the ACJ fees collected, all participant's names, and final results of the tournament to the ACJ coordinator within two weeks of completion of the tournament. Don't forget the player's ratings.

NOTE: Tournaments held in the latter part of August should be mailed to the ACJ coordinator within 48 hours.

1983 VULCAN OPEN

May 21-22, 1983 Birmingham, AL

Kogan came; Kogan won; Kogan left, although not without his share of problems. Boris breezed through the first day with easy wins against Schweinsberg, Brodie and Burnett. On the second day, however, he got rotten positions out of the opening against both Stuart Rachels and Brian McCarthy, although he eventually won both with a fair amount of difficulty. His 5-0 performance was good enough for his second clear first in the Vulcan in as many years.

"Small" Stuart Rachels after losing to Tom Denton in the Queen of

"Small" Stuart Rachels after losing to Tom Denton in the Queen of Hearts, (it was his first loss to Denton and his only loss with white in his last 66 games), was trying to make sure he was in form for the U.S. Junior Invitational in June. His 5-1 score in the U.S. Amateur Team and his 4-1 score here seem to indicate he is ready. He will be the lowest rated player in a 10-man round-robin with an average rating of 2403. He took clear second here.

Notably absent from the tournament was Birmingham City Champion, Alabama State Champion and just all-round Mr. Chess, Dana Therrell. When asked why he wasn't playing, Therrell said, "I don't know; I guess I just didn't feel like it."

A performance of note was turned in by long time 1800 Bob Brodie whose 3-2 score (losing only to Kogan and Rachels) put him within inches of 2000. Brodie tied with Sims for top Category I. Houston Chambers turned in the top score Under 1800 and Dennis Smith had a fine tournament after a feeble first couple of rounds, including a last round victory over long-time ex-Alabama great, Master Mike Lucas. Smith shared the Candidate Master prize with fellow Birminghamian Jack Gwin.

The tournament was one of the strongest in Alabama in recent history. Players from more than 5 states participated.

A BOOK REVIEW

The Queen's Gambit by Walter Tevis; Random House 1983; 243 pages, hard-cover; \$13.95

There has been surprisingly little good chess fiction. Stefan Zweig's short novel, $\underline{\text{The Royal}}$ $\underline{\text{Game}}$, comes instantly to mind, of course, as do Kester Svendsen's $\underline{\text{Last}}$ $\underline{\text{Round}}$ and a few other short stories—but the picking is generally thin. $\underline{\text{Nabokov's The Defense}}$ has received considerable literary acclaim but is rather heavy for the average reader.

It comes as a pleasant surprise, then, to find an excellent new novel by an accomplished and successful writer with an interesting and original chess theme. Tevis very skillfully traces the chess development of an eight year old orphan, Beth Harmon, who learns chess from the janitor of a rural Kentucky orphanage and subsequently becomes U.S. Champion and a world title contender while still in her teens, overcoming shyness, adversities and bouts with drugs and alchohol along the way.

We share the child's initial fascination with chess and we soon realize that we are dealing with a prodigy when she remembers games and plays them in her head as she lies in her little orphanage bed. We follow her from the orphanage to an unsatisfactory life with foster parents and we share her thrills and excitement as she discovers chess literature, then chess tournaments, and begins her meteoric rise to fame.

Tevis is a rated player (1423) and he does a remarkable jcb of capturing the intense feelings of tournament play and of depicting the various characters encountered in chess tournaments. The experienced player will spot errors in tournament pairings and proceedures but these are minor flaws.

The book is extremely interesting and it is hard to put it down. It will be read with interest by non-chessplayers since, to quote one such reviewer, it is a "wonderful story about survival" with the real suspense in "the human struggle to triumph over circumstance. Chess players, naturally, will enjoy the book even more through vicarious association with tournament play, which is described with gripping narrative suspense.

Two of Walter Tevis' previous novels (<u>The Hustler</u> and <u>The Man Who Fell to Earth</u>) have been made into successful movies and reportedly <u>The Queen's Gambit</u> is also being considered for a screenplay. If this is true, there may be an influx of new chess players. <u>The Hustler</u> interested a whole generation of Americans in the game of pool and even brought about increased sales of the brand of bourbon which the hero drank!

The title is a good one which follows quite naturally from Tevis' decision to make his leading character feminine. This was an inspired choice since there never has been a top ranking American woman chess player; it was also a nice touch to locate his child prodigy in rural Kentucky instead of in a large metropolitan chess center.

Not only did the Bobcat Boardsquad win the tournament, they dominated it. Led by Brian "Killer" Keeley and Paul "Spike" Wilson, Theodore won 17 of 20 games enroute to a 5-0 match sweep. Counting their performance in the County Chess League, Wayne Odom and James Payton's team compiled an awesome string of 12 straight match victories.

Andalusia High, last year's Top Novice titlest, battled their way to Second Place with a fine $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ ledger, losing only to the champions.

Fairhope, led by \$pen¢er "Money Man" Davis, took third place on tiebreakers over Theodore "B". Both squads scored 3-2. The Baby Bobcats received the Top Novice trophy for their efforts.

Although this year's version of the State Championship was smaller than last year's and lacked in some of the theatrics such as was provided by the likes of Southside's punk-rock army, the important elemants were there: the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat, as always , was intense.


